CENTRAL HIGHLANDS

LDMG is moving into recovery phase.

QrRS Rapid Damage Assessment Teams continue to conduct primary search and rapid mage assessment.

The number of houses that have had water enter the property is now estimated at 1200 with approximately 400 houses inundated above floor level.

Ergon Energy continuing to work to restore power with additional staff sourced from Energex to assist.

Department of Public Works have been requested to provide additional electricians and building condition assessors.

The Vince Lester Bridge is now open to the north of Emerald and the Capricorn Highway is open to Longreach.

250m washout exists on the western approach to Rail Bridge and this will require a substantial amount of restorative work before the railway bridge line will be serviceable gain. QR have advised they predict the line will be opened within 48hrs of waters acceding.

Issues are arising with people wanting to move back into uninhabitable homes. CHLDMG have been advised to seek police assistance if required.

Focus is continuing on resupply, recovery, clean up and distribution of health messages.

Department of Communities have 33 in Emerald as of today. Recovery Centre will be established at Emerald PCYC. Numbers will increase to 50 at some point. Communities are working towards outreach of smaller outlying communities.

Department of Public Works will have electricians and assessors on the ground as of tomorrow. Building Services Australia are working in conjunction with DPW.

EMO representative at DDMG level is coordinating resupply.

Hospital has been re-opened. QHealth advises a team of 6 personnel to be located at Clermont to assist with the Emerald area.

ROCKHAMPTON

The Bruce Highway remains closed from the Gavial Gracemere Road intersection.

The Capricorn Highway remains closed at the Gracemere turnoff.

Bruce Highway north is open and currently has 900mm clearance.

Gavial Gracemere Road is open to Gracemere residents wishing to travel to the Bruce Highway and then south.

The Rockhampton Airport is closed and is likely to be out for up to 3 weeks.

An Evacuation Centre is in operation at the Sports Centre, Central Queensland Iniversity, Yaamba Rd, Rockhampton with a capacity for up to 2000.

There are 64 registrations with 57 persons currently in residence at the evacuation entre (including two international tourists) and a menagerie of animals.

Other evacuations addressed as requested by individuals through the call centre. All evacuations have been standard with nil significant to report.

Aerial survey revealed a number of isolated homesteads, and some future issues with stock on high ground.

LDMG is following up with local shopping centre regarding resupply needs. Pharmaceutical needs are also being considered.

Ag Force is coordinating fodder drop requests.

iackhawks relocated from Emerald to Rockhampton today.

CENTRAL HIGHLANDS

LDMG is moving into recovery phase. LDMG meeting tomorrow (5/1/11) to consider closing the LDCC and advice will be provided in the mornings teleconference.

The Central Highlands recovery centre has been moved to the corner of Campbell Drive and the Gregory Highway and is now being operated by the SES.

Numbers falling at evacuation centres due to Vince Lester Bridge being opened and LDMG requested Red Cross to close two of the centres today.

The number of houses that have had water enter the property is now estimated at 1200 with approximately 400 houses inundated above floor level.

Ergon Energy continuing to work to restore power with additional staff sourced from Energex to assist.

Council's plumber, building inspector and other staff are undertaking door to door inspections of flood affected houses and also providing additional useful information.

Large scale damage to road structures but again further inspections when waters subside to be able to provide more accurate information.

Access is now available to the north of Emerald and the Vince Lester Bridge is now open.

Emerald can now be accessed to Brisbane by road via Barcaldine Longreach which probably be utilised resupply vehicles.

Access north across the Gregory Highway at LN1 drain is now open without load restrictions.

The highway from Emerald to Comet is closed at the Comet overflow. There is severe damage to the eastern approach of the Comet River bridge. Repairs to this area are Roadtek's highest priority. However, the road will remain closed until at least tomorrow morning.

Qantas Link services are operational and have increased their flights with the closure of the Rockhampton Airport.

Imerald – Duaringa Water Pipeline. Three pumps that service the line were burnt out. One has been repaired and the other two are in the process of being repaired. Sufficient water is being pumped by the one pump until the other two come on line. No major concerns re this issue.

The Blackwater to Bluff water line is damaged and losing approximately 50% capacity, however there is enough water getting through to continue to service Bluff. Council staff are narrowing down the area where the suspected damage is in the line and hope that full repairs will be made soon.

ROCKHAMPTON

ter levels remain high and levels exceeding the major flood level of 8.5m are likely to continue for up to seven days from today.

Bruce Highway north remains open and will remain so.

There are 134 persons in the evacuation centre at the Central Queensland University.

Emerging issue – Persons who are still remaining within the Depot Hill area are now starting to make personal resupply requests. The Rockhampton LDMG in consultation with the DDC have taken the position resupply for these residents will not occur in the Depot Hill/Port Curtis area. These residents will continue to be encouraged to evacuate to friends, family or the evacuation centre. This decision was made based on the unacceptable risk placed on emergency services workers in delivering supplies to individual houses. It further places significant strain on already stretched resources. This decision has been very clearly articulated to the media. Further dialogue will continue with affected residents.

QBuild and Ergon teams now plan to work together on affected properties to connect at a minimum two power points and one light in each kitchen and two power points and one light in a living room to allow the power access, pending private contractors completing repair work. Process to progress assessments as to those who are eligible for funding support for contractors libe progressed, to mesh in with QBuild and Ergon activities.

ne Central Highlands LDCC has now deactivated. Any calls for service are being managed and referred appropriately.

Central Highlands is in full recovery mode and the cleanup is continuing.

The Agricultural College is the only evacuation centre operational with 33 persons recorded at the centre and staying overnight Friday night 14/01/11. It will cease operations as of mid morning 16/1/11.

All evacuees have now been placed in rental accommodation and other facilities around Emerald. However Dept of Communities have identified 450 people who will need accommodation into the future.

The Capricorn Highway is open to the west of Emerald and to the East.

CENTRAL HIGHLANDS

Welfare and re-supply checks are continuing daily throughout the Central Highlands and are expected to continue for some time. Management of building contractors will be an issue. A BSA representative will be required in the community. A number of people are coming forward to reveal they are not covered by their insurance policies. Donations of clothing are no longer required because of oversupply. Still require good quality furniture & white goods. Accommodation may be an issue due to demand from affected sidents whilst repairs are being undertaken, incoming contractors and personnel from State overnment agencies and builders etc. Q Build will be assessing category 3 claims for structural sistance under NDRRA.

ROCKHAMPTON

Recovery operations are well underway with clean up of flood affected areas and assistance to affected residences. General community attitude is receptive to efforts of all agencies and groups involved in recovery operations to date. There are no emerging or major issues from a recovery perspective.

DISTRICT REPORTS

3. Summary Of Past 24 Hours By DDMG / LDMG

CENTRAL HIGHLANDS:

MG stood down however communications between the Executive of the LDMG and the Recovery Group ongoing. The rivers are receding and all towns in the CHRC area now have access to most areas. The properties are still isolated due to swollen rivers and streams, washouts on roads, wet roads or all of these issues. Immense effort has been put into the cleanup of houses and businesses in the various areas. There are still a few citizens who have not returned from leave who may have some clean up issues. The Central Highlands Regional Council Flood Recovery Coordination Group (CHRCFRCG) has been formed with a structure formulated. The functional areas of the structure are:

- · Community Support, Health and Wellbeing
- Economic Recovery & Employment
- Roads, Transport & Infrastructure
- Environment
- . Housing & Reconstruction linked to the first two (2) functional areas.

Community Recovery

- The recovery centre at the Agricultural College was closed Sunday with all former inhabitants being accommodated elsewhere.
- · The Communities recovery team has processed numerous applications.
- An insurance team has also been set up with the recovery team.
- · The Red Cross has representatives in a meeting room at the back of the Emerald library
- · Cleaning equipment and mattresses are held at the Recovery shed.
- · A shed at the showgrounds donated items (clothes, some furniture etc) available to those in need.
- A local Flood Assistance fund is being set up through the Neighbourhood Centre. This is additional
 to the Premiers flood appeal.
- The accommodation sub group will investigate the availability of short term & temporary accommodation.

- A meeting was held with the RTA during the week for information on rental properties and obligations.
- Isolated properties are being contacted to check on well being and food supplies.
- · A list of people offering services is being compiled.
- Some short term accommodation has been sourced for emergency workers
- Good communication is still an important issue an will be ongoing through various meansinc local radio, community newslatters, website & information sessions.

Infrastructure Recovery

- Water and sewerage systems are operating.
- The damage to Council and TMR roads is significant and inspections are underway. Roadworks are also underway by Council teams and contractors.
- Assessments of buildings that were inundated are ongoing with some residences already being repaired.
- The Coles Centre (Market Plaza) has to be dehumidified after which refitting will be carried out
 and then reoccupation. This could take at least 14 weeks. Some of the specialty stores such as
 Country Target have found temporary premises in the interim and Coles is looking to set up at the
 PCYC with dry goods only.
- The railway infrastructure that is damaged is a major concern to coal mines. QR National is liaising with ADF regarding repairs.

Environmental Recovery

- Large number of assessments is yet to be made but damage to crops is major.
- A survey is being undertaken of the flooding for future reference and planning.

Economic Recovery

- Damage to crops & businesses is estimated to be significant and inspections will be ongoing.
- The Mayor met with members of the insurance industry last Friday.
- Cockatoo Coal Mine is full of water and will be out of action for a long period.
- It is anticipated the economic recovery will take quite some time

ROCKHAMPTON:

Rapid Damage Assessment Team (QFRS) conducted 783 assessments – RDA Team completed operations Friday 14/1/11 and have been re deployed. The Department of Communities are currently planning for the closure of the Community Recovery Centre located at the Rockhampton Showgrounds, however ongoing support from the Department of Communities and other support agencies is still available by calling 1800 173 349 or Centrelink 180 22 66. The Evacuation Centre located at CQ University will close)Friday, 21 January 2011. The majority of residents taking refuge at the centre have already returned nome, however those who require additional support will receive case management and accommodation pport. A community clean up day has been organised for this coming Saturday, 22 January 2011 to assist with the clean up and recovery efforts of the Rockhampton community.

Free landfill access for two weeks has been offered for flood affected areas. Council has also offered free roadside rubbish collection for flood affected areas. A Distribution Centre has been established to ensure a coordinated approach to the distribution of goods that have been donated. The Distribution Centre will be coordinated through existing welfare organisations including The Salvation Army, Red Cross, St Vincent DePaul and Lifeline.

Vector Control - Council has three crews out misting for mosquitoes, sandflies, midges and black fly, seven days a week at dawn.

The majority of local roads have been cleaned.

Ergon have completed reconnections to residences throughout the region. Seventy-six residences remain disconnected and require major repair work by QBuild. QBuild have tasked those issues to their relevant contractors. Electrical connection effort statistics as of 3pm 19/01/11:

- · Total sites tasked to Qbuild contractors 250

Approximately 10 sites require new switchboards/meter boxes, however some of these are a work in progress as some severely impacted sites have only just been forwarded by Ergon. It is anticipated that this program will wind up by this Friday 21/01/2011.

The LDMG will transition to a strategic approach to the recovery operations phase with a reduced and lesser involvement from emergency service agencies.
