SITUATION OVERVIEW

1. Damage assessment Overview

(Include brief summary of key points)

BRISBANE LDCC advises that they are yet to transition to recovery, with an estimated transition date being Tuesday 25/1/2011

Flood Information Centre (FIC) has confirmed the actual height reached at today's high tide (1.75m AHD as compared to 1.55m AHD of yesterday). Extensive patrols were conducted of FIC mapping nominated and historically listed areas subjected to flooding by king tides. FINDINGS: Minimal water entered the roadway as a result of the king tide. There was no property damage to residential, business and/or Council assets. Doorkocks of potentially affected areas carried out and staff from RBH advised to move vehicles as a precautionary measure.

2. Significant Issues Summary

(Include those significant issues of interest to the QPS, Queensland Government and/or with potential for media interest)

Clearance of meat from Rocklea Markets – Progress is continuing with the clearance of meat products from failed or inundated refrigeration units within and surrounding the Rocklea Markets. Advice from LDCC is that all removal tasks have been completed. Work is currently progressing on de-contamination of refrigeration units with subsequent structural assessments to be completed.

Sub-terrainian water supply issues – Advice has been received from the LDCC that potential issues have been identified with a sub-terrainian water main running across the Brisbane River at Jindalee. It is believed that a pipe or pipes may have shifted, necessitating inspection. Consideration is currently being given to the utilization of navy divers to assess damage.

Foreshore slippage, Amity Point – advice from Redlands LDCC is that the rate of erosion/slippage has decreased and/or ceased. Furthermore, advice is that a permanent engineering solution is not immediately evident and the long term protection of 2 threatened houses is problematic, however further consideration is currently being given to the matter.

Landslip at Radnor St Indooroopilly – Advised by LDCC that a landslip at Radnor Street Indooroopilly is currently being assessed by council officers.

- On Thursday 20 January 2011, Council identified a significant slip on the bank of Witton Creek and below the northern edge of the embankment under Radnor Street, Indooroopilly.
- The slip has resulted in a 2m high vertical drop under the armco railing along the edge of the bitumen on the northern side of the road.

•	Traffic control and sandbags in place to ensure safety is maintained.
•	Ongoing inspections of the site are being undertaken to identify any cracks in the bitumen (indicatin a progressive slumping of the embankment).

Damage caused to numerous minor roads, but these are being adequately addressed at a local council level. No major highway closed at this time. Several road culverts have been damaged around the Gin Gin area, but are situated on minor roads.

SES currently ferrying food supplies to the Perry area due to flood stranded residents. Pine Creek is also being supplied food items by the SES due to flooding. These supplies are being adequately controlled through the Bundaberg LDMG.

Minor local flooding experienced in the Bundaberg City, in correlation to the Burnett River high tides, but no issues of significance experienced. One business (Bundaberg Midtown Marina) self evacuated due to high river waters.

NORTH BURNETT REGION:

Damage caused to numerous minor, but these are being adequately addressed at a local council level. No major highway closed at this time.

Gayndah town water supply pumps recently damaged (2 of 3 pumps out of action). 3rd pump currently underwater but operating. There is 1 back-up pump located in Gayndah with the North Burnett LDMG attempting to source additional back up pump. One inlet pipe for the town water is believed destroyed by the flooding affecting filtering process. Gayndah placed on level 2 water restrictions due to water supply problems. Health Notice being distributed due to discoloration in town water. DDMG (Qld Health, Media and EMQ) representatives advised and assisting. Town Water is still safe but Health Notice being distributed for precautionary purposes only. Request through SDCC for additional pump could be submitted in the future should the need arise.

3. Damage assessment overview (Include brief Summary of effects)

BUNDABERG REGION:

Damage caused to numerous minor roads, but these are being adequately addressed at a local council level. Only main road access into Bundaberg City currently via Childers Road, but this is not causing any major issues. Bruce Highway within Bundaberg district boundaries is open. Several road culverts have been damaged around the Gin Gin area, but are situated on minor roads.

SES has now ceased ferrying food supplies to residents in the Perry area. Pine Creek still being supplied food items by the SES due to flooding. These supplies are being adequately controlled through the Bundaberg LDMG.

Continuance of minor local flooding in Bundaberg City, in correlation to the Burnett River high tides, but no issues of significance experienced. One business (Bundaberg Midtown Marina) still inundated with water and small number of others businesses have moved some stock to higher ground due to minor internal flooding. This is being adequately handled by LDMG.

Bundaberg LDMG currently in "ALERT' phase.

NORTH BURNETT REGION:

Damage caused to numerous minor roads, but these are being adequately addressed at a local council level. No major highway closed at this time.

Gayndah town water supply pumps still damaged (2 of 3 pumps out of action). 3rd pump still underwater but operating. There are now 2 back-up pumps available for use by the North Burnett LDMG. Gayndah town water supply still affected with level 2 water restrictions in place. Health Notice has been distributed due to discoloration in town water. DDMG (Qld Health, Media and EMQ) representatives advised and have assisted. Health Notice distributed for precautionary purposes only. Request for SDCC to assist with an additional pump not necessary at this time.

Approximately 75 properties surrounding Munduberra have been isolated for approximately 8 days due to flooding, but majority are resilient. Possibility of some food drops being required in the future should isolation continue. North Burnett LDMG monitoring situation.

BoM hydrology modeling indicates that river heights in the North Burnett area (i.e.Gayndah, Monto, Eidsvold & Munduberra townships) will be 50cm – 100cm below 'major' classifications by late Tuesday / early Wednesday if no further rain falls. North Burnett LDMG closely monitoring this situation and prepared to respond if further rain falls and associated water levels increase.

SITUATION OVERVIEW

1. Summary of operations since last report

The water level is falling and in parts of Bundaberg some evacuees are able to return to their homes and businesses to commence the recovery process. Access to North Bundaberg is now open after the Burnett Traffic Bridge was opened this morning the Tallon Traffic Bridge still remains closed. Queensland Rail Bridge still remains closed.

Rescue, requests and operations have continued but at a low tempo for the past 24 hours coinciding with the river level dropping.

With regards to North Burnett region flooding hardly exist at all with water levels dropping significantly. Townships in this area have commenced clean up and repair.

The Prime Minister and Qld Premier visited Bundaberg on 31/12/2010 without incident.

2. Projected Operations for next reporting period

Burnett River is falling and is currently 6.8m. It is predicted to quickly and is forecast to reach 5.5m tomorrow night. It is also forecast to reach normal water levels around mid to late next week. USAR has been requested by Bundaberg LDMG to assist with recovery assessment and is hoped they will be here over the weekend. As a result, strike teams comprising QFRS, SES, and council staff will be moving into the affected areas to progressively clean up the residences. These operations will commence tomorrow.

The temporary emergency centre at North Bundaberg has been closed with all emergency operation returning to normal centres. Recovery is being initiated with operations commencing at both Bundaberg (PCYC) and Mundubbera (Outreach) tomorrow. As part of the recovery process clean ups are commencing in Bundaberg City as waters recede Bundaberg LDMG are making requests for 2 QFRS strike teams. Further areas in the Bundaberg RC area are being identified for outreach operations as those areas open up.

With the reduction in RFI and associated duties, and review of recovery progress, Bundaberg DDCC will review its operations at stand up level after tomorrow.

As a result of the direction of the Chair SDMG, the LDMG has advised the larger shopping centres that stores selling groceries and essential goods are able to open on Sunday 2rd and Monday 3rd January. This information is being provided to the public via media by the LDMG.

3. Damage assessment overview (Include brief Summary of effects)

Mundubbera and Gayndah

Flooding has ceased in Mundubbera and Gayndah due to Burnett River heights falling significantly. Most flood waters have left this area and are still heading downstream in the direction of Bundaberg.

Fallen powerlines are being restored in Mundubbera with no more than 20 houses without power. Substantial road damage sustained to all roads in North Burnett area. Some road still require bridge and road work inspections prior to opening. Road repairs have commenced. All towns in the North Burnett area are no longer isolated though there are still some minor road closures due to low lying water. Water services have been restored to Gayndah.

Burnett highway now open.

Perry - Ok, no longer isolated and phone connections restored.

Monto - Ok, no longer isolated.

Biggenden - Ok. Mainly road infrastructure damage.

Mingo Crossing flooded and still closed.

Bundaberg

Burnett River heights peaked at 7.95m and has fallen to 6.8m and expected to continue falling to 5.5m by tomorrow night. Minimal evacuations occurring overnight. Revised data provided by Bundaberg LDMG has significantly increased the flood affected properties and businesses to over 700. This increase is due to access from receding flood levels and does include the more serious ingress into yards and underhouse. The LDMG will be providing more accurate data once available. Approximately 190 residences were inundated.

The evacuation centre at North Bundaberg State High School was closed overnight with most evacuees finding their own alternative accommodation with only 3 evacuees transferred to the main evacuation centre at the Bundaberg Civic Centre. There are currently 42 after having 58 overnight evacuees in this evacuation centre.

Police undertook for (4) urgent medivacs on behalf of QAS and also deliver 3 urgent medical deliveries. Police accompanied QAS staff to air evacuation job due to the suspected mental condition of the evacuee.

Burnett Traffic Bridge has been reopened. The Tallon Bridge remains closed to all traffic except emergency services and council vehicles.

Specialty shops in Hinkler Shopping Centre located in CBD Bundaberg are closed due to underground car park being completely flooded. Woolworths and Coles are operating at this location.

Burnett River heights and associated flood levels being monitored closely.

Bundaberg DDMG is still activated in stand up phase, but is expected to return to the leaning forward level sometime tomorrow.

Power outages approximately (850 total) for South Bingera (200) North Bundaberg (330). Ergon are working on issues, power to most services is expected to return next week.

Gin Gin

Bruce Highway at Kurrajong Creed 8 km south of Gin Gin is now open to all vehicles one lane only whilst repairs being conducted. To be completely open later today.

SITUATION OVERVIEW

1. Summary of operations since last report

The water level is falling rapidly and in parts of Bundaberg some evacuees are able to return to their homes and businesses to commence the recovery process. Access to North Bundaberg is now open after both bridges opening and rail services recommencing.

With the assistance of USAR house are being accessed in the remaining flood waters to a conduct full damage assessment and assist with recovery process.

For the North Burnett region flooding no longer exists and the township has commenced clean up and repair. Recovery outreach services has commenced effective today., There are a number of outlining properties that are still isolated due to flooded roads but they are self sufficient and are expected to be reconnected to community in the near future.

The Police Commissioner and Treasurer visited Bundaberg today and attended the DDMG, they have viewed flooded areas in East Bundaberg and Bundaberg CBD.

2. Projected Operations for next reporting period

Burnett River levels are falling and is currently 3.9m. USAR have deployed to Bundaberg and commenced operations. Strike teams comprising QFRS, SES, and council staff will be moving into the affected areas to progressively clean up the residences.

Recovery is being initiated with operations commencing at both Bundaberg (PCYC) and Mundubbera (Outreach). As part of the recovery process clean ups have commenced in Bundaberg City as waters have receded Bundaberg LDMG have made requests for 2 QFRS strike teams. Further areas in the Bundaberg RC area are being identified for outreach operations as those areas open up.

With the reduction in RFI and associated duties, and review of recovery progress, Bundaberg DDCC have reviewed its operations and status will change from stand up to

leaning forward at the conclusion of today's operations. DDC and Deputy DDC will be travelling to Gayndah and Munduberra on 2-1-11 to meet with LDMG members and enhance situational awareness.

As a result of the direction of the Chair SDMG, the LDMG has advised the larger shopping centres that stores selling groceries and essential goods will open on Sunday 2nd and Monday 3rd January. This information is being provided to the public via media by the LDMG. With the Childers road opened local stores are being adequately re supplied.

For both regional council areas there are no issues with the re supply of cleaning goods.

The DDMG will no longer conduct formal meetings however arrangements in place to action requests and other requirements. As the flooding incident has diminished significantly.

3. Damage assessment overview (Include brief Summary of effects)

Mundubbera and Gayndah

Flooding has ceased in Mundubbera and Gayndah due to Burnett River heights falling significantly. Most flood waters have left this area and are still heading downstream in the direction of Bundaberg.

Fallen powerlines have been restored in Mundubbera. Substantial road damage to all roads in North Burnett area. Some minor roads still require bridge and road work inspections prior to opening. Road repairs have commenced. All towns in the North Burnett area are no longer isolated though there are still some minor road closures due to low lying water. Water services have been restored to Gayndah. Request for assistance was received from NBRC LDMG for a water pressure pump to provide town water pressure due to unexpected failure and inability to source one locally. Suitable pump has been provided by Qbuild through the Bundaberg DDMG and will be in place today.

This increase is due to access from receding flood levels and does include the more serious ingress into yards and underhouse. The LDMG are still attempting to provide more accurate details once available. Approximately 190 residences were inundated.

There are currently 37 evacuees at the Bundaberg Civic Centre which is operating as an evacuation centre.

Both the Burnett Traffic Bridge and Tallon Bridge are now open allowing increased access between North and South Bundaberg.

Specialty shops in Hinkler Shopping Centre located in CBD Bundaberg are closed due to underground car park having been completely flooded. Woolworths and Coles are operating at this location. These will open once cleaning has been completed and safety checks conducted.

Bundaberg DDMG is now operating in the leaning forward phase.

Power outages South Bingera (20) Bundaberg (190) Ergon are working on issues, power to most services is expected return by the end of tomorrow.

SITUATION OVERVIEW

1. Summary of operations since last report

Water has fallen to normal tidal levels and most evacuees are able to return to their homes or have been housed elsewhere. Most businesses in the Bundaberg area have undertaken clean up with many operating for business today.

With the assistance of USAR houses have been assessed as part of the recovery process.

The Bundaberg recovery centre has been operating with over 500 families assessed and provided assistance. This Recovery centre will continue for the rest of the week with outreach services attending outlining communities within the Bundaberg area. Outreach services are also being conducted in North Burnett region.

For the vast majority of the North Burnett region flooding no longer exists with all major townships fully into the clean up and repair phase. There are a number of outlining properties that are still isolated due to flooded roads but they are self sufficient and are expected to be reconnected to community in the near future.

A full DDMG meeting was conducted today to discuss any exceptions with regards to the response phase and also to progress the recovery phase for both regional councils and lead agencies.

Both local councils are well into the recovery phase with the Bundaberg Regional Council having already compiled their recovery initiation plan.

By the end of this week it is envisaged that both regional councils will be in a position to take full control of recovery within their own boundaries having set up fully functional LDMG recovery groups with support from relevant government (ie DEEDI and DERM) and non government agencies (ie Agforce). Upon this occurring it is believed that the DDMG will take an over viewing and guidance role with regards to recovery and provide support when required.

The Bundaberg DDCC is still in the leaning forward level (1) phase.

2. Projected Operations for next reporting period

Burnett River levels are back to normal. USAR have completed their operations and are heading to the Central Region to assist with flooding in this area.

Recovery will continue within both regional councils. The clean up will continue as well.

The Bundaberg DDCC will remain in the leaning forward level (1) phase.

DDC and Deputy DDC have travelled to Gayndah, Munduberra and Monto and met with LDMG members. The North Burnett LDMG is well into the recovery phase and appears to be handling the process well. This council will be compiling their recovery plan in accordance with the State Recovery Committee Governance Arrangements (draft). With support from State Government and non government departments at district level.

For both regional council areas there are no issues with the re-supply of cleaning goods, though the North Burnett LDMG are assessing their needs for additional high powered pressure cleaners. An RFA will be forwarded to Bundaberg DDMG if the need arises. DWP (Qbuild) are aware of this situation and possible request.

The DDMG will no longer conduct formal response meetings, however arrangements are in place for DDMG recovery committee meetings to occur.

3. Damage assessment overview

(Include brief Summary of effects)

North Burnett

Flooding has ceased in Mundubbera and Gayndah due to Burnett River heights falling significantly. Most flood waters have left this area and are still heading downstream in the direction of Bundaberg.

Roads have been repaired to a 'make safe' mode with further road works programmed over the long term, subject to NDRRA funding. Binjour, west of Gayndah, is under repair. Currently cataloging all road, bridge and recreational park damage which will be completed by the end of this week. Assistance may be sought with regards to the repair of these.

Basically all power has been restored to known faults. Water services have been restored and Mundubbera water is being tested on regular basis to ensure it meets health requirements.

RFAs received regarding Vector control with assistance being provided by Fraser Coast Regional council to the North Burnett area and by Moreton Bay Regional Council for the Bundaberg area.

Residents of uninsured houses in Mundubbera are seeking assistance regarding structural assessment with Qbuild attending to this request.

Burnett Highway - now open.

Bundaberg

A Burnett River height fallen to normal levels. Up to today USAR had conducted 332 inspections in Bundaberg City with outlining communities being assessed today.

The evacuees from the Bundaberg Civic Centre evacuation centre have been re-housed and the centre is now closed.

The majority of businesses affected by flooding in Bundaberg has reopened or has commenced the clean up process. Attended meeting held last night, called by Chamber of Commerce for affected business owners Bundaberg LDMG. SITUATION OVERVIEW

1. Summary of operations since last report

Water has fallen to normal tidal levels and all evacuees have returned to their homes or have been housed elsewhere.

Bundaberg businesses are still undertaking clean up with more opening for business today.

With the assistance of USAR houses have been assessed as part of the recovery process.

The Bundaberg recovery centre has been operating with about 600 families assessed and provided assistance. This Recovery centre will continue for the rest of the week with outreach services attending outlining communities within the Bundaberg area. Outreach services are also being conducted in North Burnett region.

For the vast majority of the North Burnett region flooding no longer exists with all major townships fully into the clean up and repair phase. A RFA is being drafted for the supply of high powered pressure cleaners to Mundubbera. There are a number of outlining properties that are still isolated due to flooded roads but they are self sufficient and are expected to be reconnected to community in the near future.

A full DDMG meeting was conducted on Tuesday 04/01/2011 to discuss any exceptions with regards to the response phase and also to progress the recovery phase for both regional councils and lead agencies.

Both local councils are well into the recovery phase with the Bundaberg Regional Council having already compiled their recovery initiation plan. Bundaberg Mayor Piefynch arrived back in Bundaberg from an overseas trip and met with the DDC and LDMG members at 12:30hrs. Full briefing provided regarding the response and current status of recovery operations.

By the end of this week it is envisaged that both regional councils will be in a position to take full control of recovery within their own boundaries having set up fully functional LDMG recovery groups with support from relevant government (ie DEEDI and DERM) and non government agencies (ie Agforce). Upon this occurring it is believed that the DDMG will take an over viewing and guidance role with regards to recovery and provide support when required.

The Bundaberg DDCC is still in the leaning forward level (1) phase.

2. Projected Operations for next reporting period

Burnett River levels at Bundaberg are back to normal. USAR have completed their operations and are heading to the Central Region to assist with flooding in this area.

Recovery, including clean up, will continue.

LDMG members for both regional councils have been met. Both are well into the recovery phase and appear to be handling the process well. The Bundaberg Regional Council have compiled their formal Recovery Plan in accordance with the State Recovery Committee Governance Arrangements (draft). The North Burnett Regional Council are compiling their recovery plan. Support is being provided to both councils from State Government and non government departments at district level.

There are no major issues with the re-supply of cleaning goods, though the North Burnett LDMG are drafting a RFA for additional high powered pressure cleaners. DWP (Qbuild) are aware of this RFA and are already addressing it. Bundaberg LDMG have stockpiles of disinfectant and sanitizing agent which is being made available to all affected households as it has been ascertained that householders themselves wish to attend to the detail cleaning of their residences. All affected households have been doorknocked again yesterday and today and clear information regarding hygiene and health provided both verbally and by flyer.

Request through DDMG to Biosecurity for permission to use vermin poison blocks not generally approved for domestic use. The blocks are to eradicate rats and mice displaced by the floods and appearing more frequently in settled areas.

The DDMG have formalized a DDMG Recovery Committee with meetings occurring. This committee will ensure LDMGs are adequately managing the response process.

The Bundaberg DDCC will remain in the leaning forward level (1) phase and are responding to advice sought and any RFAs generated from North Burnett and Bundaberg.

Whilst consideration was made to request to end the disaster declaration operating for Bundaberg district, recent BoM forecasting has indicated a further substantial rain event lasting up to the next 4 days. In consideration of that advice, the declaration will remain in place in expectation of further use of powers.

1. Summary of operations since last report

Water has fallen to normal tidal levels and all evacuees have returned to their homes or have been housed elsewhere. Bundaberg businesses are undertaking clean up with more opening for business each day.

The Bundaberg DDMG is now fully into the recovery phase.

The Bundaberg recovery centre has been operating since Sunday 02/01/2011 with about 764 families assessed and provided assistance. This Recovery centre will continue for the rest of the week with outreach services attending outlining communities within the Bundaberg area. Outreach services are also being conducted in North Burnett region.

Both local councils are well into the recovery phase with the Bundaberg Regional Council having already compiled their recovery initiation plan.

SITUATION OVERVIEW

1. Weather (Local observations)

Overcast with intermittent showers. No substantial rain anticipated. River heights expected to have minor to moderate flood impact in Mundubbera, Gayndah today & Bundaberg City through Thursday and into Friday.

2. Damage assessment Overview

Both the Bundaberg Regional Council and North Burnett Regional Council are well into the Recovery phase, with the majority of clean up completed. Vector control measures are being conducted in both regions. The main damage issue for both regions is road repairs. Nearly all roads in both regions are significantly damaged by the rain and floods, with several minor roads closed at locations due to damage.

Additional property and road damage is expected today with the return of flooding.

3. Media Issues

Due to flooding in surrounding regions, Bundaberg and North Burnett Regional Council have been cut off with re-supply of food and other goods being prevented. The townships in these 2 regions are commencing to feel the affects of perishable food shortages. Media releases are to be conducted today to update the public and re-assure them the situation is being addressed and to remain calm. Message also relates to avoiding panic buying of above.

REGIONAL REPORTS

4. Summary Of Past 24 Hours By DDMG / LDMG / Region

NORTH BURNETT REGION

Parts of Gayndah and Mundubbera received minor flooding with affected property owners being advised prior to this occurring. This flooding is due to high water levels in the Burnett River from heavy rain in the upper Burnett catchment area.

BUNDABERG REGION

Increased Burnett River levels in Bundaberg City commenced with minor flooding occurring in the CBD area. 2 businesses have sustained some flood inundation.

BOTH REGIONS

Both the Bundaberg Regional Council and North Burnett Regional Council are well into the Recovery phase, with the majority of clean up completed. Vector control measures are being conducted in both regions. Both regions are also conducting road repairs.

Recovery Centre and outreach services are still operating in both regions.

LDMG meetings were conducted in both regions, with the focus on planning and preparations for increased flooding over the next 24 – 48 hours.

Media releases and door knocks commenced in both regions to advise the affected public about further flooding.

Due to flooding in surrounding regions, roads into Bundaberg and North Burnett Regional Councils have been cut off with re-supply of food and other goods being prevented. The townships in these 2 regions are commencing to feel the affects of perishable food shortages. Inquiries conducted by both regional councils dentifying urgent perishable supplies required, with a request for these forwarded to Bundaberg DDC.

5. Projected Operations For Next 24/48 Hours

(Major problems next 24/48 hours. Anticipated resource requirements, including food re-supply)

Parts of Gayndah and Mundubbera are expected to receive minor to moderate flooding from today, with affected property owners being advised prior to this occurring. This flooding is due to high water levels in the Burnett River from heavy rain in the upper Burnett catchment area and is expected to peak today. Flood levels are not expected to reach the heights received 2 weeks ago.

Increased Burnett River levels in Bundaberg have commenced with minor to moderate flooding expected from today. This flooding is expected to peak Thursday night / Friday morning at a level of about 5m to 5.5m. A local Caravan Park, approximately 20 homes and numerous businesses will be flood affected should the river level reach 5.2m. Council modeling and advice to affected area is based on a 6 metre scenario.

Close monitoring of river heights and associated flooding to continue.

Advice regarding critical goods (bread and milk) required over the next 24hrs - 48hrs for both regional councils forwarded to SDCC.

Advice from DDC Gympie that a route has opened up through Pomona to bypass Gympie and facilitate

resupply of the supermarkets at Maryborough, Hervey Bay and Bundaberg to north. DTMR and local govt engineers have authorized travel for trucks carrying goods to resupply those cities to travel on the road and such travel will be under police escort. Accordingly, grocery chains have been advised to stage at Pomona by 0700 hrs 13/1/11 and will be escorted along a safe predetermined route to the north of Gympie. Further, once unloaded at the above areas, produce from Bundaberg can be loaded and a similar operation will be mounted to move the produce south. The above operation is not subject to an RFA as the restocking is organized privately and disaster management rests with safe passage for the essential foodstuffs only.

The arrangements for the movement and distribution of the articles rests with the respective foodstore chain. Additionally, advice re above has been forwarded to Qhealth who has 2 trucks of essential medical supplies currently at Nambour and will be placed in the convoy to facilitate distribution to respective hospitals and clinics.

Media releases to be conducted today with a view to keep the public calm and informed regarding the return of minor and moderate floods, as well as food supply issues.

Fine and clear. No substantial rain forecast for this district. Burnett River heights have fallen in this the North Burnett Region (Mundubbera & Gayndah) and pose no real threat to local communities. Burnett River in Bundaberg is slowly rising with heights predicted to peak at 5.8mts at about 1900hrs today, which will cause minor to moderate flooding the Bundaberg CBD area and some low lying suburbs surrounding the CBD.

CURRENT FLOOD EVENT

In relation to the current flooding at Bundaberg, approximately 10 businesses are inundated and about 20 properties have external flooding. No houses have reported internal flooding at this time.

With additional property and road damage incurred from the return of flooding, follow up cleaning and repairs will need to occur.

PREVIOUS FLOOD EVENT

Both the Bundaberg Regional Council and North Burnett Regional Council are well into the Recovery phase, with the majority of clean up completed. Vector control measures are being conducted in both regions. The main damage issue for both regions is road repairs. The Bruce Hwy within the district is open. The only main road accessing Bundaberg that is closed is the Bundaberg – Gin Gin Road, which is closed at Splitters Creek. Nearly all roads in both council regions are significantly damaged by the rain and floods, with several minor roads closed due to damage.

The first occurred between 28/12/2010 and 07/01/2011 and affected the communities for both Bundaberg Regional Council and North Burnett Regional Council. The second occurred from 11/01/2011 to 14/01/2011 and affected Bundaberg Regional Council communities only.

Both the Bundaberg Regional Council and North Burnett Regional Council are well into the Recovery phase, with the clean up process completed. Vector control measures are being conducted in both regions. The main damage issue for both regions is road repairs and damage to primary production. Nearly all roads in both council regions are significantly damaged by the rain and floods, with several minor roads still closed due to damage. Road repair is being conducted, but this will take a long time to complete.
