Council continues to work on drainage issues at Moore Park Beach. The tide gates immediately down stream

of Moore Park Road (nearest Gengers Road) have been

bypassed and the bank open since late February. The effects of this work is being modelled in consideration

of upgrading the existing tide gates. Drainage works

were completed adjacent to Heron Close to the north

of Moore Park Beach and have successfully resolved the

ground water problems in this location. The tidal creek

running to the Kolan River to the north was found to be

in no way related to this problem. Monitoring is ongoing

for several roads within Moore Park Beach suffering

from ground water intrusion, but, as we all know, a lot

of the problem is the high water table, the highest ever recorded. One solution being looked at is exfiltration

drains. Anyone wanting more information is

#### DUCKPOND WATER QUALITY

Concerns have been raised about the biological quality of the water in the Duckpond. The results of independent testing that were provided to Council were typically in line with a closed water impoundment that is part of a heavy natural fauna and flora environment and similar to those of other closed aquatic systems such as Money's Creek Lagoon at Bargara or the Botanic Gardens Lagoons.

#### MOSQUITOES

Following the recent floods, Council enlisted the aid of three groups of Vector Control Units that volunteered their time to assist Council staff to investigate, map, treat and monitor mosquito breeding sites. At Moore Park Beach no breeding was found in any of the major lagoon areas and waterways. Smaller water ponds in Royal Boulevard, Sylvan Drive and Moore Park Road were found to be breeding areas and were treated. In early February a complete letter box drop was done to advise residents of the need to be vigilant with household container breeding sites. In mid-February a small house to house survey was conducted. The majority of the houses surveyed were found to have containers that were potential breeding sites. We ask that everyone continue to be vigilant. Please contact Council if you would like another copy of the "Give Mosquitoes the Flick" flyer.

#### **RIVER ROAD BOATRAMP**

Council has applied to Qld Transport Marine to provide funding for the Boat Ramp and was unsuccessful for 2011/12. Even though the project has been added to the list for Qld Transport Marine 2012/13 budget consideration, the site is still subject to a favourable feasibility study. Council is still in negotiations with Bundaberg Sugar to acquire land for the car park, subject to this feasibility study.

#### **HOLIDAY PARK & KIOSK**

The Easter holidays were a good "test" for the new Managers of the Holiday Park, with many favourable comments. Pop in to

meet Di and Don at the Kiosk and try their sumptuous food and wide selection of drinks and snacks.

#### WELCOME AREA APPROVED

Following "in principle" approval by the Department of Transport and Main Roads, Council has resolved to include funding in the 2011-12 Budget to establish a short-term stop area at the entrance to Moore Park Beach.

> As well as a locality map, the area will be landscaped with a vegetation screen along the rear boundary of the site.

#### **ROADWORK PROGRESSING**

Council crews and local contractors continue work in repairing the extensive damage to Council's road network, following the recent floods:

- Several culverts in Hills Road were replaced
- Extensive pavement reconstruction has been done in Vercellios and Moorlands Road
- Zandes Road remains too wet for crews to begin reconstruction work.

Consultants LGIS are finalising Council's submission to the Queensland Reconstruction Authority for the remaining damage to the road network.

#### **DRAINAGE UPDATE**

Record high water table levels continue to impact on drainage in the Moore Park Beach area. After extensive research and modelling of the landscape and existing drainage network, Council is investigating the feasibility of two projects:

- Engineering Consultants Cardno has been engaged to undertake a detailed design of an exfiltration system for Sandpiper Grove and Royal Boulevard, in order to alleviate road inundation. This design work will be completed in 3 months so costings can be done.
- Further maintenance will be undertaken in the drainage reserve from the lagoons to Palm View Drive as conditions of the site improve to allow access. Council has called for quotations for the Preliminary Investigation and Costing of alternative drainage outlets for Murdochs Road. Extensive negotiations with the Department of Environment and Resource Management and private landholders will be required before any site work can be done.

Council appreciates residents' cooperation and patience as this work is carried out.

#### SANDPIPER GROVE AND Royal Boulevard Exfiltration System

Engineering consultants Cardno have completed groundwater model calculations and soil moisture analysis with the design of an exfiltration system almost complete. Council expects this work to be completed in November and has commenced negotiations to obtain necessary easements at Sandpiper Grove.

#### MURDOCHS ROAD DRAINAGE OUTLET

Cardno were engaged by Council to design and cost three outlet options to help dissipate water in the Murdochs Road Drain (including redefining the existing channel downstream of the Gengers Road tide gate). Preliminary acid sulfate testing of soils has been completed and significant work has been completed on a 600 hectare fine-scale drainage model incorporating engineering survey and airborne laser scanning with both flooding and tidal scenarios developed.

The three mitigation options are being assessed in order to finalise designs and Council expects this work to be completed in November.

#### **Nigel's story**

On July 23 Nigel Brennan, his sister-in-law Kellie Brennan and sister Nicole Bonney, co-authors of "The Price of Life", the story of Nigel's kidnapping and subsequent release after ransom money was raised and paid to the hostage takers, held a book signing at Zest Restaurant.

But behind this quiet man is another story. A story of a boy who grew up on the land, who harboured a desire to see the world, help his fellow man by using his camera to let the world know that there are millions of people who need urgent and

serious help.

So what led Nigel to take that path. I had the pleasure of speaking with him and his family about the boy who couldn't change those peoples' lives but inexorably changed their own.



Growing up on a property, Nigel never felt the pull of the land. After finishing at boarding school, he went to Sydney where he studied Hospitality Management. At the conclusion of the course he returned home to Moree for 18 months.

In 1996 Nigel began to travel; through Asia to Europe and then through India and Nepal. He bought his first camera soon after.

In 2000 he returned home for a family wedding and he thought of going into business with his brother, but decided that he would undertake another course so began his love affair with the camera, when he enrolled in a BA majoring in Photojournalism. After reading "One Crowded Hour" and "Frontline", he knew where his passion lay.

In 2004 Nigel built a home in Moore Park Beach, but still restless he returned to the UK. In 2006 Nigel went to Ethiopia on a photographic assignment for International Rescue Committee at Addis Ababa.

> Again the call of home brought him back to Moore Park Beach and at this time a friend mentioned that NewsMail were looking for a photographer. Nigel submitted his portfolio and for the next 12 months worked locally

while helping to build his parents' home. But he wasn't about to put his feet up on the beach so in 2008 he headed for Scotland for 6 months. He contemplated going to Afghanistan, but changed his mind, and direction, and went to Somalia. The rest, as they say, is history.

ZestRestaurant/Cafe and Takeaway was established 4 years ago by owner / chef Wayne Bryans and his wife Susan. As Wayne says "It's our aim to provide a friendly, pleasant eatery where everyone feels welcome and comfortable!"

Wayne creates all the food himself and is assisted by his new apprentice Natasha. "Customers are constantly commenting on how real the food tastes, he said, "that's because it is. We make it all, most of which is gluten free."

#### Councillor's report

Council adopted the 2011/2012 Budget in July. T floods had a huge bearing on the Budget. As well

facing a flood damage bill of around \$50 million, ongoing challenges continuing to face Council include increased operating costs to meet new standards in areas such as Environmental Compliance: escalation in costs for utilities



such as electricity and fuel, despite ongoing efforts to reduce consumption; the reduction in financial support from State and Federal Government: and increasing community expectation in demand for new and higher levels of service. We are mindful of the ongoing difficult economic climate and the increased financial pressure faced by our community. so Council has retained the 10% early payment discount on Net General Rates for all Ratepayers; and eligible pensioners will see an increase in the Council Rebate from \$90 to \$110 per year.

There was some good news for our community, including funds to reconstruct the car park near the Surf Lifesaving Club, installation of pathways on Sylvan Dr and \$500k for Drainage Design and to commence works at Sandpiper Grove.

The full budget is available to view at all Council Centres or on our website or contact me if you would like to discuss any aspect of the Budget.

majority of Australians who now realise they will be the losers under the Government's carbon tax.

Federal Member for Flynn, Ken O'Dowd said every opinion poll since the tax details were announced, reflected strong opposition from the public.

"Right around Australia, we have heard the stories of forgotten families who now realise they are at risk of losing household income because of the Green-Labor carbon tax," Mr O'Dowd said.

"This is a bad tax based on a lie, and people now know they will pay, many with their jobs. They realise the only way that they can stop the tax and keep their jobs is to put the PM out of hers.

"There is a growing wave of concern, not just in emissions-intensive sectors such as coal, aluminium and cement, but also in all the small businesses and communities that rely on those sectors," he said.

"The tourism industry, building and construction industry, retail, small business, transport and even the agricultural and horticultural industries are already forecasting job losses and that's just the beginning.

"The tax package announced offered no compensation whatsoever for people who lose their iobs." Mr O'Dowd said.

Unions and Labor supporters should heed the protests and make a stand against the Greens, who were dictating the terms against our major industries and placing thousands of jobs at risk. Ken O'Dowd MP
